



MSU Ethics Symposium

Instructions for Faculty Online

1. Please log into zoom by 7.45 AM to collect details and your badges.
2. Everyone will be provided with a Google Jamboard link (corresponding to your room number) with pages for each question. Questions 1-4 will be discussed during the first breakout session and questions 5-8 will be discussed during the second breakout session. Please check the sheets for your pre-assigned group details. If you are not in any one of the groups, we will assign you a group when you log-in. Note that there may be changes to your group membership since some faculty may have scheduling conflicts where they may not be able to make it across both sessions. However, as far as practicable, we will maintain the same groups. Questions that you will need to brainstorm are in the appendices below. 3. To take notes on the Jamboard, please use the ‘sticky note’ option (the fourth option down on the tool bar on the left), choose the color of your sticky note, add text, and save. You can continue using as many sticky notes as you need. [Please feel free to watch this short tutorial on using sticky notes.](#) (1:18 minutes). You can also use other tools from the tool bar (e.g., images, links, text box, etc.)
4. Please record as much of the discussion as possible using the Jamboard, a Google Doc, or other document that can be shared. The session is NOT being recorded to allow you to talk freely. Note that there is a graduate student who is taking notes and will also be facilitating the group. Once the session is over, the graduate student will take all of the notes from the Jamboards and share with the symposium committee for collation.
5. We will also reach out to you regarding all your notes that can inform the white paper in a post-symposium survey.



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6. The format of the online discussion will be as follows:

You are assigned questions for discussion (See #2 above for details).

Please try to hold the audience to about 20 minutes per question. Nudge the participants if you feel that each question takes too long. Please use your judgment. Richness of discussion is more important than covering all questions, for example.

Encourage the participants in your group to write down their points on the jamboard. You can move to next page with next question by clicking 'next frame' on the top of the page once the discussion of the specific question is done.

The graduate students will moderate both Session 1 and Session 2.

Appendix 1 Breakout Group Questions Sessions 1

The Imperative for MSU as the Leader in Theory and Practice of Ethics

(budget 15-20 minutes per question)

1. How is ethics relevant across the curriculum?
2. What in your view is the importance of theory and practice of ethics for MSU in advancing knowledge and transforming lives?
 - i. Is MSU succeeding (or not) in the areas identified?
 - ii. What are the reasons?
3. How will the pursuit of theory and practice of ethics in research/professional development, pedagogy and teaching enhance MSU's stature in your discipline?
 - i. Is this an imperative? If yes, why?
 - ii. If we do not do this, how will it impact MSU's core mission?
 - iii. What are the ways in which an institute at MSU can help enhance your units core mission?
4. What role would an institute play to facilitate discussions and interactions that would cross MSU while embedding ethics in pedagogy, research and outreach?



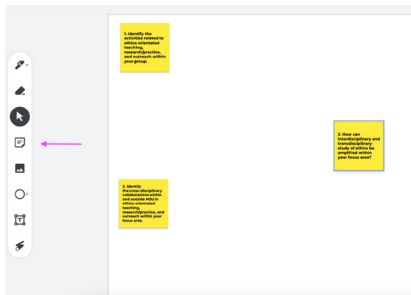
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Using Jamboard

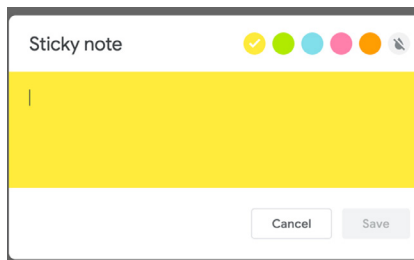
Here's a link to a [short tutorial](#) on using Jamboard.

To add to the Jamboard:

1. Select the Note icon from the menu on the left side of the screen.



2. Type your desired text in the pop-up menu. The color of the note can be changed using the menu on the top right corner of the pop-up.



3. Click Save, and your note will appear on the Jamboard. Click and drag your note to move it around the board. You can also change the size of the note by selecting it, then clicking and dragging the corners.
